Welcome to our Autumn Term Newsletter! For the past 18 weeks, the Trust has been a vibrant hub of inspiration and activity.

Since the start of July, Denewood Academy has embarked on an inspiring journey to enrich their learning environment for their growing community. The Academy has increased their pupil capacity by 40%, creating two new classrooms, several intervention rooms, and a beautifully refurbished art room.



With a transformative investment of £250,000 over the Autumn Term, the Trust also unveiled three new vital spaces: a vibrant dining room, an innovative Food Technology classroom, and a state-of-the-art catering kitchen.



Woodlands Academy proudly welcomed Ofsted visitors at the beginning of December. The inspectors observed the school's daily achievements and were impressed by the respect and politeness of our pupils. They commended our leadership team for exemplifying high professional standards, acknowledged the staff for their unwavering support of pupils, and recognised the remarkable effort invested in developing a new curriculum. The Local Governing Body was also celebrated as a vital asset to their school.

Though we cannot disclose the outcome at this moment, the Trust is encouraged that Ofsted recognises the exceptional strengths we see daily. We look forward to sharing the Ofsted report during the spring term.



At our other academies, we have observed the positive impact of the new curriculum introduced at Westbury Academy. The pupils have explored global festivals like Diwali and Dia de los Muertos in Mexico.





Additionally, they have visited various locations, including local parks, the RAF Museum, and Stonebridge City Park.

Ambleside Academy has taken inspiration from Westbury by introducing the Dolphin Pod children to geography through the "7 Continents" song. In Year 2, pupils embraced the opportunity to explore history through an engaging workshop on the Great Fire of London.





Classes 1, 2, and 3 joyfully embraced their local environment, using their fingers to paint vibrant leaves and bring imaginative leaf monsters to life! Year 5 dives into the vital skills needed to save lives, while Year 6 explores the foundations of healthy relationships.

Unity Academy flourishes by uniting our 29 alternative provision providers across Nottingham City. Our pupils have significantly enhanced their STEM knowledge. Pupils at Nottingham Education recently explored the Robotics Department at Nottingham Trent University, while those at Crisp Vocational had an inspiring visit to Rolls Royce in Derby.

Heartfelt thanks to everyone who has supported our pupils throughout the Trust, making this autumn exceptional. The dedication, hard work, and support of our parents, carers, partners, and colleagues empower our pupils to engage with a rich and purposeful curriculum. 
## **Engagement survey 2024**

During the Autumn Term, we asked all our stakeholders to 'Raise Your Voice.' Thanks to your incredible participation, we achieved our highest survey response rates. Understanding the perspectives of our pupils, staff, and parents/carers is essential for the Trust and our schools as we evolve. This article offers a snapshot of the results across the Trust, while each Headteacher will provide a more detailed report for their school in the spring term.

Our pupil survey showed that:









When asked about their favourite aspects of school, pupils expressed enthusiasm for various elements, including learning, school trips, playtime, friendships, teachers, gardening, math, art, and science, among others. Additionally, they shared some suggestions for improvement, stating they would like better school lunches, more art and drama lessons, a wider variety of clubs, and less homework.

Our employee engagement survey revealed that 75% of respondents reported spending less than 2 hours per week marking pupils' work. Additionally, 61% of respondents indicated that they do not experience burnout, and 72% either strongly agree or agree that school leaders are committed to reducing workload.







Staff members suggested that school leaders prioritise flexible working arrangements, enhance IT systems and equipment, and promote a healthy work-life balance.

Our parent survey reflects a strong sense of satisfaction, with 78% of parents believing their child has a very good or good experience at school and 89% expressing that their child is happy. An impressive 86% feel that pupils are well-behaved, that schools set high expectations, and that they would recommend their school to others. A remarkable 84% of parents affirm that their child feels safe at school, surpassing the averages of similar Trusts.

Parents enthusiastically commend our schools for genuinely caring about each child's wellbeing, understanding their unique needs, and demonstrating outstanding communication. Yet, they see even more potential for higher engagement if we can enhance after-schoolclubs, expand educational visits, and elevate the quality of lunchtime food. Together, we can continue to inspire our children and create an even brighter future!



## Woodland Art Gallery

Pupils from Beech have been working with talented Nottingham Contemporary Gallery artists on an inspiring project centred around community and perception. During the summer term, they delved into exhibitions at Nottingham Contemporary and participated in a vibrant colour and dance workshop. This initiative has empowered pupils to express themselves through creative activities. including playing instruments and singing. The project will carry on into this academic year, culminating in an inspiring transformation of Woodlands into an art gallery, showcasing the remarkable work of our children.





## Ofsted Confirms Our Strengths!

The inspectors praised our pupils' behaviour as a remarkable reflection of our school community. #### Woodlands as a Host

Woodlands Academy proudly hosted the inaugural face-to-face SEND Careers Leader and Enterprise Adviser Network event in partnership with EMCCA. The day sparked dynamic discussions on fostering meaningful employer relationships and creating empowering opportunities for SEND pupils, featuring inspiring insights from GXO and other employability experts. This event marked a significant milestone in crafting sustainable career pathways for pupils with additional needs across the East Midlands.

## Family Craft Activities

On December 5th, we hosted a delightful Christmas craft session for parents and their children. The event was well attended and filled with joy as parents and caregivers embraced their creativity alongside their little ones. We are excited to create more inspiring events like this in the future.









## Reception Pupils have been Shopping!

Classes 1, 2 & 3 practised their road safety and best behaviour on the walk to our local Asda. The children used shopping lists with four items to buy. They walked sensibly around the shop, looking after each other, and thinking about the world around them. Finally, the children took turns to put items through the scanner and to pay with coins. It was a great experience for us all - made possible by the children's excellent conduct; the Asda staff who were so accommodating; and the parent helpers who took time out of their own schedule to help.

#### Caves and Galleries

Our Year 3 pupils expanded their science knowledge with an off-site educational visit to the 'Galleries of Justice Museum.' The children worked scientifically in a range of workshops. They sorted rocks into different types and looked at how sediment can be separated with water. They explored the Nottingham Caves, where they had an amazing time looking at the sandstone structures and learning about the history of the caves. .



## Supporting Children's Learning

Parents and carers have attended Science, Writing and Maths workshops to find out about how these core subjects are taught at Ambleside Academy, and how best to help their child(ren) at home. We are always happy to welcome parents into school and have also been glad to welcome them to weekly 'open doors' Phonics Stay and Learn, Times Table Bingo, and Crafty Christmas Fun. One feedback comment from our recent parent survey stated: \*They always have something happening to keep the children interested in learning and going to school. Many schools in the area don't do half of what our school does, and I think it's amazing!" Another response to 'One thing the school does really well is: was 'They're doing different workshops for parents to help the kids' achievements.



## Giving and Sharing

Ambleside Academy ran a 'reverse advent' activity to help support the local community. As a school, we feel it is important to support our local families at this time of year. Each day, the children brought in an item listed as the day's donation. Each donation was rewarded with a raffle ticket, and there were 34 lucky winners of selection boxes.
